

Hospitalfield emerges from fifteen months of building with a wonderful range of studio facilities.

There are so many brilliant arts organisations in Scotland with great workshop facilities, we made the decision long ago not to replicate this but simply to provide working space. The studios have many different qualities that can be used in so many different ways.

The 21st century studio, our first new building, is designed to accommodate digital practices, with light, sound proofing and acoustics carefully considered.

The study days that pepper the programme focus on aspects of performance, experimental film and the archive. These are topics that test this new studio and reflects the work that is currently underway with architects Caruso St John, on the design for the next phase of development; the collections and archive study centre.

The mid-nineteenth century studio, built by Patrick Allan Fraser for himself, with its beautiful north light and range of adjustable shuttered windows has been completely repaired. The two vast early 20th century studios, built for the opening of the art college in 1902, are repaired and perhaps most importantly, insulated. Heated through air source systems, they have been made ready for the next 150 years or more. Tucked in to the eaves of these studios, is a library and reading room with its window looking over the fields to the sea.

The bothy will become the home for the Free Drawing School. The old laundry and tack room buildings restored to accommodate the horticulture programme.

In 2024 we welcome you to Hospitalfield, to the gardens, café, chapel and the tours and events as usual. In the background the team will be operating these new facilities for the artist residency programme and for other bookings as they come along. We very much hope you will have an opportunity to visit and take a look.

Our public programme takes on the subject of 'grain'. A complex starting point as we consider the significance of a single grain of wheat and what its 'quality' offers future food security. We look back at old maps of the Angus landscape, rich land fertilised by seaweed, once producing far more grain than it does today. This is land that earned the description of the golden triangle.

We also consider the meaning of the word 'grain' in the context of time and accumulation; an irritation that produces a pearl or variances in climate producing the grain in a plank of wood.

Please join us for as many events as you can within the busy year ahead. We look forward to seeing you and sharing with you the great changes that are taking place here as we restore the important Arts and Crafts buildings and build new where there is an urgency to do so.

Programme 2024: ALL ABOUT GRAIN

In 2024, our programme has been planned around the theme of grain. In this pivotal year for Hospitalfield's programme, when we unveil our new and historic artist studios after extensive restoration, we are interested in themes around growth, nourishment, and this basic form of sustenance – grain.

Patrick Allan-Fraser and his 19th century peers, were consistently inspired by the natural world of their rural surroundings. One of the first Governors of Hospitalfield, William Calder Marshall, carved the marble sculpture titled 'Agriculture' on the columns of the Albert Memorial in London; we see the flora of the local environment carved in fruitwood by artisan wood carver David Mavor in the ceiling of the Drawing Room at Hospitalfield; and there are carvings of grain fields in the sandstone walls of the Memorial Chapel. While agriculture was being mechanised as part of the ongoing effects of the industrial revolution, Allan Fraser and his peers romanticised traditional rural practices around the growth and harvest of grains. When Hospitalfield was founded as an art school in 1901 it was under the guise of the 'great rural experiment' – a term which continues to challenge and inspire us as the coasts and landscapes around us change.

In 2024, we will work with artists, gardeners, farmers and historians to consider this wide ranging thematic in our public programmes and engagement groups, peaking during our annual Summer Festival in August.

We'll be thinking of grain in its vital form as sustenance that is grown, harvested and made into food – particularly through our participation with Scotland the Bread, we'll be growing a heritage grain field of wheat and rye in the lower Walled Garden with our volunteer Garden Club to be harvested and baked.

We'll also be thinking about the global importance of grain and the impact of war on agriculture through our collaboration with Kultur Medialna in Dnipro (Ukraine), and artists and curators Katya Rusetska and Diana Khalilova, which is supported by the British Council.

This is a rich topic, that will allow for artistic interpretation and analogy, through poetic form and the grain of film. And we will experiment with possible interpretations through discussion, walks, workshops and making, as well as with invited specialists and artists to help us to expand our knowledge and understanding of these intertwined themes in relation to Hospitalfield.

Come and join us at various points in 2024 to make some bread and grow your knowledge of grain!

The exhibition features work by artists who have been part of the residency programmes at Hospitalfield as well as a library of community art projects, contributed by people and organisations all over Scotland.

Mapping Grains around Hospitalfield

Saturday 27 April, 11am – 4pm

Join us for an introduction to the Hospitalfield library, our collection of 18th century maps, and work with local artists to map the contemporary and ancient history of our locale.

Springlore Showcase: Fiona McCubbin & Tayside Healthcare Arts Trust

From January to March artist/florist Fiona McCubbin worked alongside an arts and healthcare group to explore the subtle seasonal shifts between Imbolc — a Celtic festival celebrating the emerging life in the world around us, and Ostara – a modern Pagan solar holiday honouring the spring's warmth.

You are welcome to explore the outcome of their activities which include botanical sculptures and photographs focusing on folklore and the histories surrounding seasonal change.

An exploration of alternative, playful mapping techniques and experimentation with zine making will be led by artists Aaron McCarthy and Alison Scott. Drawing inspiration from Hospitalfield's cartographic collection and the surrounding landscape, the workshop welcomes conversations about the deep histories and shifting boundaries of the grounds, as well as broader connections to trade routes and changing land use.


Wollemi Pine Plant Out

Friday 3 May, 2pm

Join us to plant out our young Wollemi Pine (*Wollemia nobilis*) in front of the newly renovated studios. Called by some as the 'dinosaur tree,' the Wollemi pine was known only through fossil records and thought to have been long extinct until 1993 when it was discovered growing in a temperate rainforest in New South Wales. Since its discovery, the pine has been propagated and proliferated around the world. Gifted to Hospitalfield by the Botanics in Edinburgh, our Wollemi has been nurtured as a young sapling in our fernery and is finally big enough to grow outside. Join us to plant the young tree out in front of the newly renovated artists' studios, learning about the tree's unique history and celebrating the new green space available to visitors, artists and residents outside of the finished studios.

Fieldworks with John Glenday

Weather permitting, the reading will be held in the stunning grounds of Hospitalfield House, where words, music and gardens can meet. John Glenday is a poet based in Carnoustie, Angus.

Children's Annual Graduation Project with Frieda Ford

Thursday 13 June 2024

A yearly event where 400 pupils from our most local primary schools Timmergreens and Muirfield work with an artist to celebrate graduation from primary seven to high school.

This year's Annual Children's Graduation Project will be led by artist Frieda Ford – an Edinburgh based film and textiles artist who has a socially engaged practice. With an emphasis on collaboratively built knowledge, Frieda explores narratives and leads the creation of collaborative performance arts events centred on folklore and storytelling.

Frieda was an interdisciplinary resident at Hospitalfield in 2023, and was selected for the Young Scottish Filmmaker Prize (GSFF, 2023) and has screened work nationally and internationally. She regularly facilitates workshops for all ages and has a particular love for green screening and tin foil costumes. She was part of the socially engaged project, *Your Art World*, which is on display at the National Galleries Scotland and is currently Lead Play Artist with Collective Gallery.

Sites of Memory: Experimental Film Study Day


Programmed by artist and filmmaker Ufuoma Essi

Join us for a study day exploring artist's approaches to memory, and archives through film – using it as a medium to disrupt, challenge and reposition archives within their work. Focusing specifically on artists working with moving image, film, expanded cinema and found

footage, the day will feature film screenings, talks and contributions from artists, filmmakers, writers and curators including Tendai Mutambu.

Ufuoma Essi is an artist and filmmaker, working predominantly with film, moving image and sound. Her research revolves around Black feminist epistemologies and configurations of displaced histories, aiming to interrogate and disrupt the silences and gaps of political and historical narratives. Ufuoma is part of Hospitalfield's Future Plan Artist Residencies in 2023-24.

Angus Doors Open Day

**Saturday 7 – Sunday 8 September,
12pm – 4pm**

The Memorial Chapel (also known as Mortuary) was designed by Patrick Allan-Fraser as a memorial to his late wife Elizabeth and her deceased parents John Fraser and Elizabeth Parrot Fraser. Work began in 1875 based on an outline plan by Allan-Fraser to which he added details as building progressed. Everyone who visits quickly realises that this is a remarkable building, possibly the most unusual and most instantly appealing of the many fine buildings within Arbroath.

Study Day on The Voice

How can the voice be worked with meaningfully? The voice can operate as the primary mode of complaint, making demands, speaking truth to power. There is a kind of voice that is considered powerful, that is considered worthy, to which value attaches.

A day of workshopping, performance and conversation will centre the voice as a malleable and powerful material that can be worked and shaped by the speaker. This study day seeks to activate audiences through experimental and embodied workshops conceived and facilitated by artists and practitioners who are developing distinctive means of training the voice within a framework of social justice.

Residencies

Over more than a decade, our residency and artist development programmes have given time and space to artists to develop new work at a pivotal time in their careers. Patrick and Elizabeth Allan-Fraser's 19th-century vision was to leave a legacy for the support of artists and education in the arts; today we interpret this same vision through a contemporary prism.

Our residency programme hosts artists from Scotland and much further afield. It is rooted in the visual arts, yet invites artists working across disciplines, and is designed for artists to spend time focussing on questions, problems and ideas that

will have an impact on their work now and into the future.

This year, residents will be welcomed back into our newly restored 19th- and 20th-century studios, and our new 21st-century studio. Each residency is between two and four weeks in duration, and we host approximately 70 residents each year, including visual artists, dancers, writers, poets, musicians, filmmakers, gardeners, and other cultural practitioners. Most applications are submitted for our annual application deadline, the selection is made by a small jury of different individuals each year, invited because of the regard with which they are held within their creative specialism.

Each residency brings together between 10 to 12 artists, to work in the studios and grounds; working alongside each other, eating together and forming long-term connections. These opportunities are essential for cultural workers who we all must support and nurture if we are to continue as an internationally impactful creative nation.

Hospitalfield frequently works in partnership or as a consortium with a range of organisations. Current collaborations include:

Long-standing partnerships with New Contemporaries, Chamber Music Scotland and British Council.

Three-year residency exchange partnership with Edinburgh Sculpture Workshop and Fonderie Darling in Montréal, supported by Conseil des arts de Montréal and British Council Scotland.

Residency exchange partnership with Tabakalera San Sebastian and CCA Glasgow supported by Etxepare Basque Institute and British Council Spain.

New partnership with Kultur Medialna in Dnipro Ukraine for the GRAIN project, with support from British Council Ukraine – comprising residencies and development of new performance work at Hospitalfield Summer Festival.

Our group tours and visits are currently conducted verbally, in English.

Through our Learning programme, we run a number of artist-led projects with local schools and

community groups in Arbroath and Angus including the Children's Graduation Project with Muirfield and Timmergreens Primary Schools (since 2017) and our ongoing collaboration with Tayside Health & Arts Trust (since 2021).

We work regularly with the high schools in Angus on our programmes. Our Young Artist Club for 14 – 18-year olds in Angus was initiated in 2021 and runs annually. Participants are recruited through an open call and through our local partners, and is an opportunity aimed at young people who have barriers to accessing the arts.

We continue to grow our long-standing developmental partnerships with Angus schools and key third sector organisations such as Tayside Healthcare Arts Trust, Angus Carers, Angus Community Mental Health Team, Glen Isla & Glen Clova Women's Charity and Voluntary Action Angus.

Free Drawing School

The Free Drawing School is a programme of experimental drawing inspired by Hospitalfield's historic walled gardens and unique setting. Led by an artist living within the DD region, the Free Drawing School programme offers opportunities for participants to learn in a welcoming space, to be creative, to make new connections and to talk in a relaxed atmosphere.

The first Free Drawing School residency took place in 2019, this is the first year that the Free Drawing School will have its own fully dedicated restored studio space within the historic context of one of the first art schools in Scotland.

Get involved with Garden Club

The Hospitalfield Garden Club has been running since 2016 and has been responsible for the transformation of the Garden and Grounds. The flourishing of the garden and the great change would not have been possible without the help of the garden volunteers who meet weekly to prune, weed, sow seeds, and harvest the garden. In 2021, the garden was redesigned by Nigel Dunnnett and the Walled Garden and newly restored Fernery were opened to the public. Dunnnett's design for the garden tells the story of Hospitalfield's horticultural history as a site that has been tended for 800 years. In 2023, with support from Angus Rural Partnership, Garden Club celebrated the completion of the Physic Garden, a quadrant in the walled garden

filled with medicinal herbs which explore Hospitalfield's early history as a monastic hospice.

This year, Garden Club will embark on a Soil to Slice project with Scotland the Bread, growing rye and wholemeal grains in the lower Walled Garden. With this new project, Garden Club will explore growing nutritious grain on a small scale, monitor its development, share their collected data with a network of small-scale grain growers in Scotland, and then harvest, thresh, mill and finally bake the grain.

Garden Club meets every Friday from 10am – 12pm and is led by our Community Gardener Carley Wootton. If you would like to join Garden Club or help in the garden in other ways, please let us know by emailing kirsten@hospitalfield.org.uk.

Place Programme

Hospitalfield cannot be an island, we can only succeed fully if we see our future as existing in a region where there is a wide and diverse cultural offer. We are committed to working in partnership with our local communities and neighbouring groups and organisations in Arbroath and Angus to make sure Angus, this rural region on the North-East coast, has a dynamic creative and cultural ecology.

We are a partner in the commissioning of the Angus Culture and Heritage Strategy which is being led by ANGUSalive. Through meetings in 2024 ANGUSalive is generating the promised action plan from this carefully woven strategy, and reflecting on what the culture and heritage communities of the region have achieved since 2021.

Within our Place Programme this year we are organising community events at the Memorial Chapel to plan for its future; these include

research visits, grain events, poetry and any way we can think of bringing the community together around this special place. These gatherings of the community are informing our fundraising to restore the Chapel and make it more widely accessible.

Remembering Together is another community project where we will work with designer Mickey Fenton and artists Abbey Craig and Lily Garget to create a project with communities across Angus, memorials to remember the complexity and impact of the Covid pandemic. The outcome of this project will launch 31 May 2024 at Montrose Playhouse.

Another project is the New Scriptorium, designed by Bobby Niven and sited elegantly at Arbroath Abbey. This commission opens up the Abbey to visitors, particularly local people. We believe that the Abbey is the town and the town the Abbey, and if the two aren't part of the same whole, Arbroath cannot thrive. In 2024 Creative Project Coordinator Kristina Aburrow is leading on a programme of community activity, young people programmes and residencies with writers and artists including Erin Farley, Shane Strachan, Lesley Harrison, Felicity Bristow and John Glenday.


